EDUCATION

When disabled kids cannot attend school like other kids, there are the following options:

- They can get extra help at school attending **parallel classes** with specialised teachers
- They can attend **special schools** of all levels
- They can attend classes in **hospitals, rehabilitation centres, prisons for adolescents** and so on if they live there.
- They can get **private tuition at home**

HOWEVER, there a lot of problems related to buildings, equipment, teaching material, teachers and so on.

Special schools need educators and staff as well as safe transportation for the disabled kids.
